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Fall Fair

The Cochrane Fall Fair is one of the oldest fall fairs in Northern Ontario, running since 1913. It is also the Northernmost Fall Fair in Ontario. The fair runs the first weekend after Labour Day - on Friday from 6-9 and on Saturday from 10-5. The annual auction is held Saturday at 3:30pm.

Membership

Membership is required to exhibit at the Cochrane Fall Fair, except for Junior exhibitors.

Any adult may be a member of the Cochrane Agricultural Society and the Cochrane Horticultural Society. Fees are \$15 for the current year (\$7.50 per society). Members are entitled to exhibit at the current fair in all classes.

Non-profit organizations and groups are also eligible to be members and exhibit at the Fall Fair, provided the \$15 fee is paid. However, individuals may not enter in the same section with their personal membership number and the membership number of a group.

Fees of \$15 will be deducted from prize winnings of \$17 or more for membership in the following year.

Juniors, in this book, refers to exhibitors in grade 10 or lower. Grade refers to their grade during the previous academic year. Juniors may exhibit in the classes for their grade level or higher. There is no fee for exhibiting in Junior classes, however, if Junior exhibitors wish to enter an adult class, they must pay the adult membership fee.

Exhibitor forms and entry tags

Exhibitor forms must include the exhibitor's name, membership number, mailing address, telephone number and each item exhibited. Items not entered on the form may be disqualified. Completed forms must be given to the Secretary at the fair desk when exhibits are dropped off. Forms will be provided during exhibit drop-off times and year-round on the website.

All exhibits must bear the appropriate tag with the exhibitor's name and number. Tags must be folded to conceal the exhibitor's name and number, otherwise they are a cause for disqualification. Tags are available during exhibit drop-off times and year-round at Flowers by Jenny-Lynn. Other locations may be added, and will be listed on the website.

Items to be donated for auction are greatly appreciated. *If you plan to donate your exhibit, please obtain a coloured sticker from the Secretary at the fair desk to place on the entry tag.*

Exhibits

Exhibits must be brought to the appropriate building at the fair grounds (385 First Ave.) on the Wednesday evening before the fair between 7pm and 9pm or the Thursday morning between 9am and 11:30am. Entries will not be

accepted after 11:30am on Thursday morning. (Exception: Livestock and entries in the Cattleman's Beef Contest must be brought to the fair on the Saturday morning.) Exhibits must remain on display until 4pm on the Saturday of the fair. Removing exhibits before this time is cause for disqualification. Directors responsible for each class will determine where and how items are displayed.

All entries must be new, clean, the work of the exhibitor and never before exhibited at this fair, excluding Livestock classes (Classes 1-14) and Potted Plants (Classes 23 & 24).

Exhibitors may enter only one item in each section in all classes except livestock classes (Classes 1-14).

Fair Directors will take every reasonable precaution to have security while exhibits are on display to prevent accidental damage, injury, loss or theft. Exhibitors accept the risk of exhibiting, and no compensation will be paid for damaged, lost or stolen exhibits.

OAAS Competition

The winners of certain classes and sections (as marked) will qualify to enter their exhibits at the district level. Cochrane Agricultural Society is a member of District 14. Winners at the district level are eligible to exhibit at the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies provincial convention. For full details, see page 41.

Judging

Prizes are awarded only for first, second, and third place, unless otherwise published. Judges may use their discretion whether to award a first prize or any other prize in a section, regardless of the number of entries. The judges' decisions are final.

Exhibitors interfering with a judge before judging is completed is a cause for disqualification.

Awards

Awards will be presented at the Annual Awards Banquet (date to be published in the local newspaper, on our website, and on social media pages). Awards for exhibitors not in attendance will be mailed to the exhibitor at the address listed on the exhibitor form.

All plaques awarded, with the exception of Junior Floral and Vegetable and Junior Photography must be returned to the Secretary by the Thursday of the following fair before 11:30am.

Points are awarded to the winners of each section as follows: first 3 points, second 2 points, third 1 point.

Junior exhibitor in Grade 4 or lower with the most points in Classes 20 & 26; presented by the Cochrane Horticultural Society

Junior Floral and Vegetable

Junior exhibitor in Grade 5 or higher with the most points in Classes 20 & 26; presented by the Cochrane Horticultural Society

Most Points in Canning & Baking

Exhibitor with the most points in Classes 27 & 29; presented by the Cochrane Agricultural Society

Nellie Burkholder Award

Exhibitor with the most points in knitting (Class 33); donated by the Burkholder family

Lucinda M. Young Memorial Plaque

Exhibitor with the most points in all fabric classes (Classes 33-42); donated by the Young Family

Rachelle Genier-Vachon Award

Judges' choice for the most outstanding entry in all fabric classes (33-42); donated by the Cochrane Agricultural Society

Most Points in Photography (Adult)

Exhibitor with the most points in Class 57; presented by the Cochrane Agricultural Society

Most Points in Photography (Junior)

Junior Exhibitor with the most points in Class 58; presented by the Cochrane Agricultural Society

Complaints or grievances

Complaints or grievances must be lodged in writing and delivered to the Secretary of the Cochrane Agricultural Society at 385 First Ave., Cochrane, Ontario P0L1C0, within seven days of the close of the fair. Complaints may be entered but will not be read before the end of the fair. Complaints must be accompanied by \$10, which will be returned if the complaint is deemed valid.

No verbal complaints or grievances will be registered.

A committee of grievances will be formed by the directors, at the invitation of the president, to determine whether the complaint or grievance is valid. Decisions by the committee are final.

Administration

The Cochrane Fall Fair is administered by the Board of Directors of the Cochrane Agricultural Society.

Directors will disqualify exhibits and withhold payment of prize money in any case of fraud, deception or dishonest practices in preparation, ownership or representation of any exhibit intended to influence judging or eligibility.

At the discretion of the directors, in the case of fraud, deception or dishonest practices, exhibitors may be prevented from entering items in subsequent fairs for one or more years.

Upon request, exhibitors must make a statement of declaration to the Committee of Grievances that articles exhibited by them conform to the Rules and Regulations published in this Exhibitor's Guide. Refusal to make such a declaration will result in disqualification and forfeiture of prize money.

Volunteers

Agricultural classes

Animals being exhibited must be in show condition and free of disease. Provide proof of rabies vaccination where possible.

All cattle must have RFID tags. All other animals must be tagged according to CFIA rules.

Exhibitors may enter two entries per section in Classes 1-14. Animal exhibits are eligible for only one prize per section.

Livestock must wear an appropriate halter. A cane or show stick may be used, but a cattle prod may not be used.

Exhibitors must provide own enclosure or cage for Classes 8-14.

Animals must be at the Fairgrounds between 9am and noon on Saturday and removed by 5pm on Saturday. Cochrane Agricultural Society will not be responsible for animals left on the Fairgrounds after 5pm on Saturday.

Bulls aged 8 months or over are not permitted on fairgrounds.

Animals exhibited must be the property of the exhibitor.

The name of breed or cross must be written on the tag.

Judging is based on an animal's adherence to breed standard.





Exhibits must be in plastic bags. A slice or flake of hay must be at least 4" thick. Judging is based on maturity, colour, odour, leaf-to-stem ratio, moisture and condition, legume-grass balance, and purity.

Section 1: Haylage, 75% or more legumes Section 2: Haylage, mixed grasses and legumes Section 3: Hay, 75% or more grasses Section 4: Hay, 75% or more legumes Section 5: Hay, mixed Section 6: Cereal silage, name type(s) of grain



Horticultural classes are sponsored jointly by the Cochrane Horticultural Society and the Cochrane Agricultural Society.

Judging varies in classes and between sections, but generally is based on trueness to type, condition, colour, form, and in floral categories, stem foliage.

Uniform specimens (similar in size, colour & shape) are more favourably judged in multi-item sections.

Vegetables, fruits, and herbs

Entries are to be exhibited on sturdy plates or trays, except where specified "in water."

Exhibits may be washed or polished with a soft cloth, and where applicable (e.g. beans, peas, tomatoes), exhibits must have stems attached.



Floral and plants

Definitions

Bloom	A single flower on a stem (remove extra buds)
Bud	A closed immature flower. A bud becomes a bloom when it shows colour.
Collection	Contains 3 or more varieties
Display	May contain 1 or more varieties
Double	Variety of flower with extra petals; often a flower within a flower
Single	A flower with one set of petals
Spike	A thick, upright stem carrying several flowers
Spray	A portion of the plant carrying several flowers on short stems, and often foliage
Stem	The stalk; may carry one or more flowers and buds
Variety	Flowers of different colours or types

In addition to the following sections and classes, we also accept exhibits of unusual varieties for display only (not to be judged). Please label any such entries with names.

Tips for exhibiting annual, biennial, and perennial flowers

- Cut stems as long as possible (at least 6")
- Choose open blooms, free from blemishes
- Foliage from the plant should be included whenever possible
- Note the number of stems, bloom, or spikes required
- Narrow-mouthed clear glass (bud, vase, small bottle) is the preferred type of container for Classes 21 and 22.
- Containers may be weighed with small stones or marbles to prevent tipping.
- Flowers should be of the same colour or type unless specified "any variety."

Tips for exhibiting potted plants

- Groom plants to remove old or damaged flowers
- Soil should be moist but not dripping wet
- Pots should be attractive and clean, but judging is based on plants only
- Flowering plants should be in bloom

Tips for exhibiting floral arrangements

- Unless specified, entries should be suitable as centrepieces and should be visually appealing from all angles
- Good design focuses on balance, proportion, scale, rhythm, contrast, and dominance
- Accessories are allowed, but floral elements should be the main feature of the design

Section 1: Blue moon, shades of blue & white, showing on one side Section 2: Tea party, arrangement in a cup and saucer, maximum 9" tall Section 3: Everlasting, dried homegrown flowers Section 4: Rose bowl, one rose bloom with own foliage Section 5: Floating garden, one bloom (not a rose) with own foliage, floating on water Section 6: For the birds, containing a bird house, maximum 16" diameter Section 7: Oktoberfest, yellow flowers with grains, fruits and/or vegetables Section 8: Pixie perfect, maximum 4" tall and 4" diameter Section 9: Quilt block, square with maximum diameter of 12", in low container, maximum 4" tall Section 10: Summer wine, red or burgundy flowers, in a wine glass Section 11: Tea time, flowers in a teapot, showing on all sides Section 12: Walk on the wild side, wild flowers & grasses Section 13: Walk softly, fresh flowers in a recycled shoe or boot

Section 14: Where have all the flowers gone? fresh foliage, berries, fruits or seed pods (no flowers)



Make the cake: Whisk the cake flour, baking powder, baking soda, and salt together in a large bowl. Set aside.

Beat the butter and sugar together on high speed until completely creamed together and fluffy. Add the oil and beat until combined. Add the eggs, egg whites, and vanilla extract and beat until combined.

Add dry ingredients and buttermilk in three additions, mixing after each addition just until incorporated. The batter will be velvety and thick. Gently fold in the sprinkles. 

The **Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies** (OAAS) hosts an annual convention in February. Winners in select sections of their local fairs are eligible to compete at the district level, and winners at the district level are eligible to compete at the provincial level at the convention. In the case where the district winner is unable to send an entry to the convention, then the second-place district winner will be eligible to enter.

Baking

District and provincial exhibits must be on a clean, sturdy plate (no paper plates) inside of a clear plastic bag with the exhibitor's name and address using the entry tag provided. Entries must be reproduced from the same recipe as at the regional level.

BUTTER TARTS

Prizes District level: determined and paid by the district Provincial level: first \$50, second \$30, third \$20 (donated by Gay Lea Foods Co-Operative)

A total of 6 tarts must by shown. They may not contain fruits (e.g. raisins) or nuts (e.g. pecans). Tarts must be full-sized (not mini or bite-sized). Entry must be made solely by the person entering competition (including pastry). Provincial level only: First, second, and third place entries will not be returned to the exhibitor but will be placed for auction at the convention.

JUNIOR CHOCOLATE CHIP COOKIES

Prizes District level: determined and paid by the district Provincial level: first \$20, second \$15, third \$10 12 prizes of \$5

Contest is open to youth up to age 15 years (as of December 31 of current year).

Entry must consist of 8 plain chocolate chip cookies, with no nuts, which must be no larger than 3" and no smaller than 2".

Quilts

Upon making an entry into the OAAS quilt competition, the exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition. The winning OAAS champion quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future district and/or convention OAAS competition.

Exhibitors will retain ownership of their quilts.

Posters

Entries must be hand drawn on the topic of 'Promoting Your Fair," with the name and date of the fair clearly shown. Posters must be between 22x28cm and 28x44cm (without border), centred on card stock or Bristol board, exposing approximately a 5.5cm border on all sides.

Judging is based on overall appearance, hand drawn, and OAAS criteria (size, material, theme).

Junior: up to Grade 4 Intermediate: Grade 5 to Grade 8 Senior: Grade 9 to Grade 12 (Grades 11 and 12 must pay the adult membership fee to enter) Exhibitors of honey must be registered beekeepers and the exhibits shown by them must be pure honey from floral sources in their apiaries.

HONEY

Prizes District level: determined and paid by the district Provincial level: first \$50, second \$30, third \$20

Liquid honey exhibits shall consist of two clear glass containers, each having a capacity of 500 grams (375 mL). Entries must be labelled on the BOTTOM of the containers only with a supplied entry number of identifier. No other labels will be permitted. An approved colorimeter will be used to assess the colour. Any honey entry containing any form of foreign material will be disqualified from the competition.

Judging will be based on appearance (density, brightness, flavour/aroma, uniformity, colour), clarity, and containers.

Maple Syrup Competition


All maple syrup exhibits should have a flavour characteristic of its respective colour class and be free from any objectionable odour or taste. It is best to sample from the same lot before submitting your entries to the OAAS.

MAPLE SYRUP

Prizes District level: determined and paid by the district Provincial level: first \$50, second \$30, third \$20

Maple syrup exhibits shall consist of two (2) Kent style glass bottles, or equivalent, of maple syrup, Canada Grade A - Amber, each having a capacity of 250 mL. Entires must be labelled on the BOTTOM of the containers only with a supplied entry number or identifier. No other labels will be permitted Any maple syrup entry containing any form of foreign material will be disqualified from the competition. An approved maple syrup colorimeter will be used to assess the colour.

Judging will be based on density, flavour, colour, and clarity.





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
